NWSCC is holding its annual Man and Woman of the Year competition. NEW this year - any club member may directly nominate someone from ANY NWSCC club who they feel is deserving of being chosen as NWSCC's Man and Woman of the Year! The NWSCC Board will review all Man and Woman of the year nominees and will choose one man and one woman to be NWSCC's 2010-2011 winners. NW SA informs the skiing public about ski area development issues in Oregon and Washington. This site also provides

an opportunity for skiers to take an active role in helping ski areas get US Forest Service approval of their master plans. It's easy and your help is always needed! See www.nwskiers.org/NWSA/NWSA.htm.

This year three Washington ski areas have new lifts: Crystal Mountain, The Summit at Snoqualmie, and White Pass, and we assisted all of them! Just announced January 7: The Forest Service has approved three projects as an amendment to Crystal Mountain's 2004 Master Development Plan. The projects include the replacement of the High Campbell chairlift, replacement of the wastewater treatment plant and various modifications to the Bullion Basin lift and trails. NWSCC provided favorable support and comments every step of the way.

### Notes From the Upper Elevation:

We have learned from our Washington clubs that there is legislation proposed in the State of Washington that could impose fines of up to \$1,000 on skiers/riders caught skiing/riding out-of-bounds at any of Washington's ski resorts. Not only is a potential fine involved, but the fine is issued by respective sheriff's offices, and results in an actual citation being issued. While Oregon has similar legislation, there is a significant difference: the policing of out-of-bounds snowriders is left up to the individual resort, with "fines" limited to loss of skiing privileges. (Note: since this can mean having your pass pulled for the season, the financial ramifications could be significant.) Legislation in both states includes reimbursement of any costs involved in rescue/medical evacuation of out-of-bounds skiers/riders. Again, this is only a legislative proposal, but all kinds of questions are raised: Who will be authorized to hand out the "citations"? What effect will this have on already-clogged court systems and under-staffed Sheriff's departments? Will a potential \$1,000 fine actually deter out-of-bounds skiers?

We'll keep you posted!

Closer to home, NWSCC club members can show their membership card at the ticket windows at **Crystal Mountain** on Sunday, **March 27, 2011**, to get **half price lift tickets!** 

You can still sign up until February 18 for the Oregon Cancer Ski Out, which will hold its 23rd annual event March 6 and 7, 2011, at Mt. Hood Meadows, at the early bird price of \$900 for a team of 5, or \$180 for an individual! If you want to race and don't have a team, you will be placed on a team by signing up on the website under "Team Misfits." After February 18 you can call Nancy Chinn at 971-221-5872 to see if there is still a spot available. A full 97% of the funds raised at this event go directly to local beneficiaries: the Knight Cancer Institute at OHSU, Providence-Willamette Falls Hospice and Hospice of the Gorge, Candlelighters, and new this year, the Health Care Chaplains Ministry (a non-sectarian, non-profit professional chaplaincy organization that recruits, trains, certifies and encourages Christian Chaplains serving in healthcare facilities), without any restrictions on how they use the donations. See the website at www.CancerSkiOut.org to see more about how these organizations make use of these funds. Over \$627,000 has been raised over the years by this wonderful organization; \$38,000 last year alone! Also on the website you will find all the information and forms necessary to sign up as a team for this year's event, to sign up as a sponsor, to donate, or to learn anything you might want to about the event. The registration for a 5-person team is \$900, and registration for an individual is \$180. While this may seem like a large amount to some, the cost covers 2 days of skiing; your meals, including 2 breakfasts, 2 lunches, and a fantastic dinner and party at the Best Western Hood River; racing and coaching with a staff that includes Olympians (think the Mahre brothers!); silent and oral auction items; and "serious fun"! Best of all, you don't need to be a serious racer to enjoy this event - the winning team has scores based on the consistency of team race times between the two days of racing! Prizes are awarded to a number of the top teams. Teams and individual team members are also involved in fundraising, both in person and online, and those who raise the most money also win special prizes! Donations are welcome from anyone and may be made through the website, either to a team, individual, or directly to the event! Sponsors are extremely important to this event - all sponsors receive recognition and advertising in the program; sponsors of \$1,000 and over receive longtime recognition by being on the T-shirt given to all participants and volunteers; and lots of recognition, banner placement, etc., throughout the event for major sponsors. Hope on the Slopes, a benefit for the American Cancer Society, will be held at Mt. Hood Skibowl March 11 and 12, 2011. This is the third annual event in Oregon. The format is a vertical challenge to raise funds for the American Cancer Society. Individuals can sign up for \$35, or the team cost is \$150 for up to 10 members (early bird rates expired December 31). Lift tickets for participants are reduced to \$35 for the full event. It will be a great party with live bands all 24 hours, BBQ, fun activities, and a celebration of the fight against cancer! Emilio Trampuz will again be in charge of the Torchlight Parade, and will take names of people who want to participate. The number of participants in the parade will be limited by the number of torches available, so sign up early! The parade is an awe inspiring sight as it wends its way down the mountain and the torches are placed into the message "HOPE" at the bottom of the hill! - · History Committee The committee is planning to produce FWSA ski history DVD's. The convention theme is Making History; content is available and can be edited and compiled, and volunteers are willing to provide the backbone for the production. Such DVD's would have long lives in Speakers Bureaus for club, council, and community organizations. Content should be ready for assembly not later than March 1 in order to produce and premiere in June at the Convention.
- · Forms and Guidelines Developed by ski clubs and ski industry Here you can find an RFP (request for proposal) form developed by federation members along with industry. In addition there are sample by-laws, fam (familiarization trip) guidelines, budget guidelines, and job descriptions for various club offices. Attached on the NWSCC newsletter web page are a Standardized Request for Proposal and Fam Trip Guidelines. Also available from NSCF is a powerpoint Technology and Marketing Workshop Presentation.
- Tamarack Ski Resort is Back—Located in central Idaho, Tamarack offers great snow, no lift lines, friendly staff, great prices and amazing views of the valley and lake. The resort re-opened Dec. 20 for the first time in 20 months. Tamarack Municipal Assoc is the group of property owners that pushed ahead to re-open the ski area this winter while the ski area owner wrestles with the bankruptcy court. The group vaulted over one big hurdle to re-opening with the state land board. TMA and Credit Suisse, the company that foreclosed on the resort, paid around \$480,000 for the lease to cover running the ski area through 2011. TMA is operating the resort in the interim until a buyer can take

over. Meanwhile, the homeowners hired staff to operate the resort with the lifts scheduled to run Thursdays through Sundays, plus holidays. "We're creating 65 jobs in a valley of 8,000 people with 30 percent unemployment," said TMA board member, Doug Dvorak. TMA plans to run five of the seven lifts, including one to the summit, and operate two restaurant-style bars.

• Reno Tahoe Winter Games Coalition Working Behind the Scenes for 2022 – While the 2022 Winter Olympics are years away, the Reno Tahoe Coalition is working behind the scenes in preparing its bid for the U.S. Olympic Committee to contend for the games. Even talk of bringing the Olympics is good for business, making north Lake Tahoe in the ski industry "the hot space," said Andy Wirth, the new head of Squaw Valley USA. More so than any other sector, long-term planning for the Olympics dovetails with long-term planning required for transportation, said Lee Gibson, Regional Transportation Commission executive director.

· North American Tree Well Fatalities Are Sober Start To Winter. Tree wells claimed two lives at Whitefish Mountain Resort within 10 days of each other, causing skiers, snowboarders, and resort officials to assess ski habits. The deaths are two of five tree well fatalities in North America this winter and a sobering start to a winter of big snows. A 29-year-old male snowboarder died after falling into a tree well Jan. 8 at Whitefish Mountain Resort. A 16-year-old male skier was found buried in a tree well Dec. 29 and died four days later when taken off life support. Both had been cruising the off-piste trees alone. Tree well deaths stand in a class by themselves known as Non-Avalanche Related Snow Immersion deaths (NARSID). In short, a skier or snowboarder falls upside down in the soft, loose snow at the base of a tree and suffocates. Over the holidays, tree wells claimed the lives of a 29-year-old male snowboarder at ChinaPeak Resort, Calif., and a 32-year-old female snowboarder on a snow cat trip at Retallack Lodge, B.C. A 20-year-old male snowboarder found dead in a creek on Dec. 25 at Whistler Blackcomb was trapped in an inverted position after falling in deep snow. His death is classified also as NARSID.

Fine victuals all—possibly one of the best on-mountain meals some of us ever tasted. That night, Far West sponsored a "pub crawl" in neighboring Ketchum. With no races Tuesday, we skied to our hearts' content. That evening, NWSCC'ers headed into Ketchum for dinner at the storied Pioneer Saloon. #### SKIER SAFETY: FALLING FOR YOU

In late December 2010 eight people were injured when a chairlift at Sugarloaf Ski Resort in Maine derailed. As we all know, when a chairlift stops, be patient. Almost always the lift will start up again...no problem. Derailments like the one in Sugarloaf are very rare. Those who did fall were cushioned by new snow. Thus, the Sugarloaf incident teaches us that choosing a soft landing spot is crucial in reducing injuries from any fall.



While skiers and riders cannot eliminate the risk of an unlikely event such as the Sugarloaf scare, the incident got me thinking... Why do some folks who fall from great heights survive with few injuries while others do not? Here I list some suggestions that may reduce severity of injury falling from height:

- 1. Avoid falling in the first place if possible.
- 2. If falling from a great height (such as an airplane or building) make like a skydiver... face the ground, arch your back, bend your arms and legs slightly. Using your arms and legs, aim for a soft landing spot such as deep water or deep snow.
- 3. Relax as you near the ground.
- 4. With your feet together, fall on feet first.
- 5. Land on the balls of your feet first.
- 6. Tuck and roll.
- 7. Protect your head on the bounce.
- 8. Seek immediate medical care (if you are conscious).

In contrast from falling from a height, falling while skiing is an expected part of the sport. If falling while skiing:

- 1. Become aware of the pending fall.
- 2. Relax and don't fight the fall.
- 3. Fall uphill if possible. Why? Falling uphill is a shorter distance.
- 4. Avoid hard objects like rocks or trees.
- 5. Get out of the way of other skiers.
- 6. If you can't move or suspect a back injury, ask a buddy to mark your spot from above with crossed skies.
- 7. If injured, ask for help and stay put in a safe place until aid arrives.
- 8. If you are ok, smile! You are in good company. Every skier and rider bites the dust at one time or another.

Editor's note: It is with great sadness that we announce the deaths of two ski club members this year. Both were skiing in Lake Tahoe, and both died as a result of falls while skiing. Donna (DiDi) Drummond broke her neck in a fall onto a rock at a Tahoe ski area, and was transported by helicopter to a hospital in Reno. She was paralyzed and died about a week later, on January 3, 2011. Donna was an avid cyclist, skier and traveler, and a long time member of the Cascade Prime Timers Ski Club. A memorial service will be held on February 13, 2011, from 5-8 pm at PNCA, 1241 NW Johnson in the Pearl District, Portland.

Two days later (January 5), Les Davenport, a member of the Desert Ski Club and Mountain High Snowsport Club, sustained a fall at the Homewood Ski Area in the Lake Tahoe area while on a solo ski safari type trip. When the ski patrol arrived, he was out of his bindings and had apparently hit his head hard, followed by a slide into a tree.

Our condolences to their families and friends; they will be missed. And please ski carefully!
